





An added attraction with this band was getting to see, and visit with, the last of our Founding Fathers, Bill Reinhart. Bill has been gone way too long. What a solid bass line he laid down. Many of us also opined on the amount and quality of rhythm that could be produced by Isabelle Fontaine on that washboard.

Your Board is hard at work to find a solution to attendance issues. We know that we are not alone. Other societies are also seeing a decline in general membership attendance. Unlike other nearby Jazz Societies, we are blessed with a much better than average attendance of fine musicians for our jam sessions. I cannot leave that subject without conveying a special thanks to Dick Williams for his fine leadership of said jam sessions.

Attendance and budget are synonymous here. Low attendance results in lower income.

We are laying out almost \$500 every Sunday Session; and that is just for the rent

at the Elks. When we pay for a guest band, that is another cost approaching \$500. Door receipts, dues and income from our raffle are our major income sources. Donations, in the past, have helped immensely.

We have heard several comments about bringing in food from

the outside. As you may know, this is a definite NO-NO, and we again ask you to comply. One of the conditions in our lease with the Elks Lodge is just that....No outside food is to be brought in. We have tried, over several years now, to get that rule changed. This seems to be a major issue with the Elks Lodge. It is a condition they will not remove from our Lease Agreement.

Wow! That is about it for my Heavy Stuff Rant! I feel lots better now! Here is your homework - a music enjoyment link for the month. This is a tune I like and hope you will too. The tune is simply called **<u>Bill</u>**. It was recorded January 7, 1938. This cut has a great line up of musicians: Personnel: Adrian Rollini - bass sax, Jackie Russin – piano, Johnny McGee – trumpet, Paul Ricci – clarinet, Al Duffy – violin, Frank Victor – guitar, Frank Clark - string bass, and Buddy Rich – drums.
